#LochEwe75 Commemorative Event:

29th and 30th September 2017

To further our #LochEwe75 celebrations we are holding an event to commemorate the 75th anniversary of PQ18. On the Friday evening we be showing The Cruel Sea in Aultbea Hall, and on the Saturday there will be a day of events including a guided tour of our Exhibition, a guided walk around Mellon Charles Boom Defence, and an illustrated talk on the Battle of the Barents Sea by Andrew Choong Han Lin (National Maritime Museum). Snowdrop Memorial Garden

It is fast approaching time for us to start planting our memorial garden. We are planting it next to our Exhibition Centre to commemorate the 3000 allied sailors who were lost on Arctic Convoys. It will include some 3000 Snowdrops, and other white flowering plants such as Rhododendrons, Azaleas, Narcissi, Hydrangeas, and Cherry Trees. We also intend to include engraved paving slabs in the garden. One for every million Russians killed during WWII. Reports

Our New Home

It has been our goal since we started to have a permanent home for our collection and late last year the opportunity to acquire a building in Aultbea presented itself. The property was built as a bicycle factory and has more recently been used as a butcher's shop. It needed extensive work to convert it to suit our purposes and an army or volunteers and tradesmen were brought in.

Throughout the winter, the team worked tirelessly alongside builders, electricians and plumbers to convert the building in time for our official opening on the 7th May 2017. Outside, car parking areas were created, fencing painted and signs erected.

Meanwhile, the ladies were busy creating a new gift shop area with the assistance of local joiners. Lots of local gifts and crafts stocked the shelves and the Aultbea Exhibition Centre was ready to open its doors in time for our Loch Ewe 75 Festival in May.

#LochEwe75 WWII Festival

In May we put on our weekend festival celebrating the 75th anniversary since the first convoy to leave Loch Ewe for Russia. It was a huge undertaking, with events in multiple locations but was well attended with lots of lovely feedback.

The Spitfire

One of the main attractions was of course the Spitfire display over Loch Ewe on both days. The Spitfire was owned by Historic Aircraft Collection (HAC), based at the Imperial War Museum airfield at Duxford, Cambridgeshire, and was flown by Mr. Charlie Brown.

The aircraft, a Supermarine Spitfire Mk. VB, aircraft serial No. BM597 (civil registration G-MKVB) was one of an order for 1,000 Spitfires's, and was originally delivered to 37 Maintenance Unit (MU) in February 1942. It was then passed to an operational RAF (Polish) Wing and served with both 315 & 317 Squadrons.

It was damaged in February 1943 and subsequently did not see further operational service. From 1950 it was designated a Ground Instructional Airframe and was allocated the number 5713M. From then until 1989 it served as a Gate Guard at a number of RAF Airfields. Eventually it was sold to HAC and restored to flying condition.

In 2005 it flew to Malta to take part in the 'Merlin's over Malta Project'.

It took part in our festival in the markings of 317 (Polish) Squadron, coded JH C.

Re-enactors

We were so lucky to be able to host the Thirteenth Guards Poltavaskaya Rifle Division Living History Group, and the Northern 40s Re-enactment Group. They really brought the 1940s to life for everyone. The T34 tank delighted crowds, as did the replica Spitfire and Messerschmitt.

Arctic Convoy Veterans

What made our festival extra special of course, was the attendance of some of the Arctic Convoy veterans, some of whom had travelled from Russia for the occasion. We have greeted British Arctic Convoy veterans to our shores a number of times in the past, but this was the first time that we are able to welcome their Russian counterparts. It was hugely significant that it was be the first time Russian veterans were present at Loch Ewe - the location where convoys departed to Murmansk and Archangel.

An Emotional Visit from a Wartime Deck Hand based in Loch Ewe

This week we received a lovely visit at our Exhibition Centre from 95-year-old Alexander Clark. During the war, Alexander had been a deck hand aboard the Empire Sprite, a tug based in Loch Ewe. He witnessed the sinking of the American liberty ship, the SS William H Welch on 26th February 1944. His tug attempted to

rescue the stricken vessel by firing a line. Alexander remembers this action. Having fired the line the tug anchor chain snapped (most unusual but testament to the conditions) and she drifted away. She returned for another attempt, but the liberty ship had broken in two and was lost.

Collection update

We have added some fascinating items to our collection recently. Some notable additions include: A 1 Krona note belonging to Wilfred Townsend, who served on the Cape Portland during the war. He kept the note as a souvenir of his time in Iceland. During the war, Iceland could not be supplied with coin currency and so it issued its own locally produced 1 Krona notes on poor quality paper. Wilfred's note is dated 1941.
